


HEALING GARDEN

INSPIRATION

The idea of a Healing Garden was brought to me by clergy abuse victims, priests and the Office for the Protection of Children and youth staff members. They proposed the construction of a healing garden as a place of refuge, prayer, reflection and solitude – a sacred space where healing resources would be available, and where God, whose presence and goodness is most visible in nature, might help all of us on our individual paths toward healing and reconciliation.

The Healing Garden Planning Committee, comprised of four victim-survivors, two diocesan priests and staff members from the Office for the Protection of Children and Youth, was formed in January 2009. Cardinal George was presented a preliminary blue print in the summer of 2010, which he approved. The initial construction of the Healing Garden began in November 2010. The Healing Garden was blessed and dedicated on June 9, 2011.



Soil

The Healing Garden is located at Our Lady of the Holy Family Parish at 1080 West Roosevelt Road in Chicago. The historic location of the parish makes it an appropriate site for the Healing Garden that is situated adjacent to the Church and Parish Center. Holy Family Church was one of only two to survive the Great Chicago Fire in 1871.

Light

The center path of the Healing Garden leads directly to a sculpture titled The Circle of Love. The sculpture symbolizes the Holy Family joyfully dancing together within the Healing Garden. The bronze sculpture weighs just under 600 pounds and the Holy Family's hand-held circle encompasses nearly six feet in diameter. The artist, George Michael Myers of Prescott, Arizona, has been creating expressive figure sculptures for over 40 years. The Circle of Love in the Healing Garden is a gift from the Sisters of the Holy Family of Nazareth.

Trees and Plants

Over 25 varieties of trees, plants and flowers can be found in the Healing Garden. The areas on either side of the central pedestal for the sculpture include ornamental Pink Knock Out Rose, Pink Diamond Paniculata Hydrangeas, "Royal Purple" and a variety of perennials. Between the maples on the street are large shrubs, "Chicago Fire," which are called "burning bushes" for their bright red color in the fall. At the site where the central garden path joins the east path, there is flowering "Spiced Bouquet."
